A scatter of medieval pottery indicates medieval use of the area but the only probable medieval feature was a cess pit. A single sherd of Roman pottery in a stratigraphically early gully suggested some utilisation of the area in the later 2nd century. [Au(abr)]

Three trenches were mechanically opened. A number of medieval and post-medieval pits were identified, with three cesspits, two of medieval date and one undated, two refuse pits. Two, possibly three phases, of medieval pits were identified. In addition three 17th century stone lined drains were recorded in plan and section. An 18th century barn outbuilding wall was also identified. Finds were recovered from the bonding wall (a copper alloy pin and glass fragments) and medieval pottery was recovered from the layers sealing the cess pits. [Au(abr)]

The trenches contained a relatively high density of features, mainly boundary or drainage ditches, a post hole and layers that contained medieval occupation debris. It is suggested that some boundaries, oriented north-east to south-west, may predate the establishment of Croft four. A large amount of pottery was recovered from the features dating the period of activity on the site to between the 12th and 14th or 15th centuries. Small amounts of residual, late Iron Age, Roman and Saxo-Norman pottery was found. [Au(abr)]
