Although no features or deposits of obvious archaeological potential were noted, the identification of widespread ploughsoil layers over the western half of the site indicated that a lack of modern disturbance and augered well for the survival of any archaeological features that lay within the general area. The deposits encountered within the main north-south foul water drain trench clearly demonstrated widespread disturbance to down to subsoil level within the eastern half of the site. [Au(abr)]

Although only four foundation pits were excavated, the results have confirmed that archaeology of quality and importance survives in this location. A seventeenth century pit/ditch feature was partially exposed and the finds recovered from its fills indicate that the survival of organic material is excellent. The recovery of leather and cattle horn-cores suggests that tanning/leatherworking was taking place in the seventeenth century. Roman soil layers were also identified and it is reasonable to suggest from the findings that any deeply cut Roman features in the general vicinity will similarly contain important well preserved organic material. The archaeological potential of the general location was very high. [Au(abr)]

Despite the archaeological potential of the site, being on the southern edge of the known medieval and post-medieval settlement of Macclesfield, the watching brief demonstrated that later development and disturbance in the area had largely removed all evidence for earlier use of the site. A few isolated pockets of earlier plough or garden soil were preserved on the slope down to Bollin, however, and these produced a small quantity of pottery dating from the medieval and early post-medieval periods. This limited evidence would support the theory that this area lay on the edge of the settlement and was most likely occupied by fields or small gardens during the medieval period. [Au(abr)]
