The concrete foundations of the commanding ordnance officer's quarters were observed overlying the stone quay wall. During construction work an additional stone foundation was uncovered to the north-east of the test pits. Plans showed that this was part of the original armoury building which was demolished in the early 1900s. [Au(abr)]
