A desktop assessment was carried out in advance of proposed new residential units and car park area in Area A and open space in Area B, in the north-east part of the site. The site may have lay close to the Anglo-Saxon church of St. Helen's, dating from before 1066. It could also conceivably contained urban settlement plots or traces of the town defences which probably extended across the ridge from Bridge Gate. The site was part of Goodwin's Orchards in the post-medieval period, on land associated with Old St. Helen's House, a residence built on the site of the medieval hospital. The site was not used for buildings until the early 19th century, when both small industrial structures and several middle class residences were built. One of the latter was also called St. Helen's House until it was demolished in the early 19th century. The site had been largely used for commercial buildings. [Au(abr)]

The majority of standing buildings on the site were of post-1950s construction, with the exception of a railway station complex and loading wharf, and a gasworks building in the middle of the proposal area, a second railway property to the south and two stone-built cottages towards the south end of the site. These were all early mid 19th century in date and all retained original features. The biggest area of

A desk-based assessment was undertaken of land to the south of Simmondley, Glossop. The assessment was required in relation to a proposed new bridleway route from Plainsteads Farm to High Lane. The assessment comprised a site visit, documentary and cartographic research. The proposed route passed through an area of coal mining, probably 18th to 19th century in date and part of Simmondley Colliery. Further the southeast were a series of small quarry pits for the extraction of sandstone for local building purposes. These mainly appeared to have pre-dated the 20th century. A number of hollow ways were in close proximity to the route, some possibly medieval or earlier in date.

For part of its route, the bridleway followed the course of a suggested Roman road, although no traces of this were visible on the ground. Prehistoric flint artefacts had been recovered at Whiteley Nab, close to the proposed route. There was a risk to archaeology in some areas of this proposed bridleway route. [Au(adp)]

Kinderlee Mill was constructed in 1804 and underwent extension and conversion until some point before the first documented map of the area, the OS 1st Edition of 1878. At this point, barring minor alterations, the mill had a similar form to that which could be seen at the time of this work. By the 1980s at the latest, though probably by the mid 20th century, the mill was used for light industry and by 1997 had fallen derelict. There was a lack of documentary evidence for Kinderlee Mill and very little about it could be discerned from the sources and resources consulted. The building survey recorded the remaining fabric of the mill and noted that it had undergone a number of extensions between its construction and the first recorded maps at the close of the 19th century.
