Introduction

This publication represents the nineteenth in a series of Gazetteers that aim to provide an easily accessible annual listing of information about the nature and extent of archaeological investigations carried out in England. The series was developed from *The Assessment Gazetteer 1982-1991*, which was issued as as *British Archaeological Bibliography Supplement* (no.1) in October 1994. It was quickly realised that *The Assessment Gazetteer 1982-91* was very limited in scope, it only dealt with Archaeological investigations directly related to the Town and Country Planning system in England, i.e. desk-based assessments, field evaluations, and environmental assessments. The present series is more ambitious, by encompassing other kinds of intervention types that involve some degree of ground disturbance which results in the recording and, in consequence, the destruction of archaeological deposits. As the project has progressed other forms of archaeological investigations have also been included in its remit; this not only expanded the criteria for how archaeology was undertaken, but included more detail of why archaeological recording was carried out i.e. as part of a building recording or estate management plan.

This latest Gazetteer has been compiled as the principal output of the *Archaeological Investigations Project (AIP)*, carried out in the School of Conservation Sciences at Bournemouth University for English Heritage between April 2009 and March 2010. An analysis of the main trends in the pattern of archaeological activity in England will be published as a separate report in due course. Background: The listing of archaeological investigations

The publication of systematic annual gazetteers of archaeological investigations in England is neither new nor innovatory, but long overdue. In the early years of the present century the Earthworks Committee of the Congress of Archaeological Societies included within its annual report listings of "record and discovery" and "excavation" events. These reports were published for the years from 1903 down to 1939 (from 1931 to 1939 as the Research Committee) and contain much valuable information. Nothing similar was produced in the years immediately following the Second World War, however in 1961 the Ministry of Public Building and Works began publication of *Excavations: Annual Report*, a practice continued by its successor the Department of the Environment, down to 1976. The Council for British Archaeology published an annual review under the title *Archaeology in Britain* between 1967 and 1992, although its coverage focused on, and was structured around, the work of member organisations and institutions rather than sites and projects.

Some of the major "period" societies also began publishing annual listings of work falling within their particular academic areas of interest. *Medieval Archaeology* has since 1957 carried a section dealing with recent work; *Post-Medieval Archaeology* since its first publication in 1968; and *Britannia* since its first publication in 1970, building on a precedent established for Roman studies and published in the *Journal of Roman Studies* between 1921 and 1969. Nothing so comprehensive ever emerged for prehistoric archaeology, although the *Proceedings of the Prehistoric Society* carried a section containing summary excavation reports for most years between 1977 and 1985.

In recent years, a number of county archaeological journals have begun carrying listings of discoveries and summaries of projects within their geographical areas of interest. At a broader scale, many of the Council for British Archaeology's regional groups publish lists of recent work in their newsletters/annual reviews.

All of these summaries and reviews provide invaluable sources of information about projects and discoveries. They are important both for the time at which they are published and in a retrospective or historical context. Indeed, for a variety of reasons, some of these summaries are all that is known about investigations that have never been adequately published. The reality, however, is that since 1939 there has been no comprehensive summary of completed and ongoing archaeological work for England. Trying to stitch together what does exist in piecemeal summary listing is not easy and in any case does not give a complete picture. This situation contrasts with that in Scotland and Wales, where comprehensive annual summaries have been published by the Council for Scottish Archaeology since 1955 and the Council for British Archaeology Group 2/Wales since 1961.

The need for a summary account of work in England is made still more necessary by the sheer pace and scale of archaeological activity, and the common interest shared by all archaeologists in wishing to know what has happened where and when, so as to better inform their work and alert them to the implications of their findings. In the case of minor investigations with limited positive results, the publication of a statement in an annual summary, together with an appropriate report to the relevant Sites and Monuments Record may satisfy professional obligations to publish and make available the results of work undertaken.

Content, scope, sources and format

A wide range of archaeological investigations were considered by *AIP*, and these investigations can be broadly classified according to the nature of the work itself. Eight main groups are recognised, and in this classification use is made of definitions and guidance contained in planning guidance (DoE 1990) and the series of "standards" issued by the Institute of Field Archaeologists.

- I **Desk-Based Assessments (Database Code B):** Assessments of the known or potential archaeological resource within a specified area or site (land-based, inter-tidal or underwater), consisting of a collation of existing written and graphic information in order to identify the likely character, extent, quality and worth of the known or potential archaeological resource in a local, regional or national context as appropriate (IFA 1994a, 1; and see DoE 1990, para. 20).
- II **Field Evaluations (Database Code C):** A limited programme of non-intrusive and/or intrusive fieldwork which determines the presence or absence of archaeological features, structures, deposits, artefacts or ecofacts within a specified area or site (land-based, inter-tidal or underwater). If archaeological remains are present, field evaluation defines their character and extent, and relative quality; and it enables an assessment of their worth in a local, regional, national or international context as appropriate (IFA 1994b, 1; and see DoE 1990, para. 21).
- III **Environmental Assessments (Database Code D):** These are programmes of work carried out under the terms of the European Directive 85/337/EEC and council directive 97/11/EC (implemented in the UK as *Town and Country Planning (Assessment of Environmental Effects) Regulations 1988* (SI 1199) and *The Town and Country Planning (Environmental Impact Assessment) Regulations 1999* (SI No.29), respectively), and often combine desk-based assessment and field evaluation.
- IV **Other Investigations (Database Code E):** This embraces a wide range of archaeological investigation types, which mainly fall into two groups in terms of their rationale. First are "post-determination" events such as open-area excavations, watching briefs, recorded observations and building surveys that are carried out under the terms of a planning condition or agreement of some kind in advance of development; this work is sometimes collectively referred to as "rescue archaeology". Second are excavations and surveys of various sorts that are undertaken outwith the requirements of the Town and Country Planning system; investigations falling within this second group are sometimes referred to as "research" excavations, but this is a misnomer since all archaeological investigations are pieces of research.
- V **Estate Management Surveys (Database Code F):** These will be similar in nature to a desk-based assessment for development purposes, but relates instead to the production of a defined-purpose management plan. Such work is likely to include documentary research, inspection of existing records, walkover inspection surveys and perhaps some limited fieldwalking or geophysical surveys.
- VI **Building Recording (Database Code G):** Archaeological Building Investigation and Recording is defined as a programme of work

intended to establish the character, history, dating, form and archaeological development of a specified building, or structure, or complex and its setting, including its buried components, on land or under water (IFA 1996, 1).

VII Geophysical investigations (Database event signifier H): To include the following types of archaeological investigation: Electromagnetic survey, Ground penetrating radar, Magnetic susceptibility, Magnetometer, Microgravity, Resistivity, Resistivity depth sounding, Resistivity profile, Seismic Refraction

VIII Maritime investigations (Database event signifier M): Archaeological maritime investigations for the most part, use broadly similar land-based archaeological techniques that have been adapted for use underwater (The marine archaeological resource, IFA 2000). As well as intrusive archaeological techniques and visual surveys Geophysical and other remote techniques have also developed for use in an underwater environment. Areas of estuary and intertidal areas have been included under this designation.

Apart from desk-based assessments forming part of the development control process, or archaeological building recording other kinds of non-interventional survey have been omitted, unless they are reported alongside interventional events. One obvious example of this split is with geophysical surveys which are sometimes carried out as discrete events while in other cases as part of multi-method study. Three main sources were used in identifying and tracking down information about completed and ongoing projects. First, and by far the most important source, were reports and records inspected during visits to archaeological contractors and curators in every county. Second were published listings and summaries of projects undertaken. And third were completed returns of *pro forma* report sheets circulated to local societies, University departments, and organisations which could not be visited by research staff from the AIP. Throughout this work the emphasis has been on archaeological projects that have been completed during the year, no matter how large or small they may have been. In the case of long term projects spanning several years, the archaeological works actually carried out in the year covered by the particular Gazetteer are listed.

Most of the reports summarised here are circulated typescript or loose-bound volumes prepared on a desk-top publishing system. Few of them have ISBN

numbers, and their circulation is typically restricted. Within the sphere of commercial archaeology at least, most were produced for clients in support of planning applications, as background papers for public consultation, or in fulfilment of planning conditions or agreements. No details of availability or cost are provided, but the name of the issuing authority is given wherever possible. Neither English Heritage nor the originators of this Gazetteer are able to supply copies or extracts of any of these reports (except those for which they are themselves the issuing authority), and any enquiries about the reports listed should be addressed directly to the relevant issuing authority.

The details given are as full as may be permitted from scrutiny of the reports themselves or from information supplied by authors, issuing authorities, or, exceptionally, summary sources. Wherever given, the site name is as set out in the report, as are National Grid References. The bibliographic reference follows the style established by the *British and Irish Archaeological Bibliography*. Where no specific author is identified on the report's title page (or elsewhere in the report) the term "Anon" or the name of the relevant investigating body is used in place of the author's name. Where no exact title for a report has been supplied by the issuing authority a substitute title enclosed in square brackets has been given (e.g. [Report on an evaluation at Windcott Hill]).

Wherever possible the author's own summary has been used in whole or in part, but where this is not available a short abstract of the report has been prepared by a member of the *AIP* team. These abstracts should be regarded as general statements of what the referenced report contains. While every effort has been made to check details of sources and the content of summaries, the Gazetteer originators accept absolutely no responsibility for errors or inaccuracies in the material presented. **The listings are intended as fair guides to what is available rather than a set of definitive statements. Accordingly, the original documentation should always be checked if it is to be referred to in publications or discussion.**

Where possible, SMR reference numbers have been included in the entries, but at the time of the visits made to collect data many reports had yet to be entered into the relevant SMR system and so had not in consequence had a number assigned to them. The format of the entries is detailed further in the section below entitled "Anatomy of a typical Gazetteer entry: guidance notes for users".

Anatomy of a gazetteer entry - notes for users

- **TB PICNIC SITE, NUTWOOD**
- ***Archaeological Field Evaluation: TB Picnic Site, Nutwood (NAFG Report No. 12/2001)***
- Bear, R T Nutwood: Nutwood Archaeological Fieldwork Group, 1999, 15pp, colour pls, figs, refs
- The area proposed for development was, in the 18th century, part of Nutwood Common. The site was semi-wooded and was used for hunting from the 16th century. The common was enclosed by Act of Parliament in 1780. By 1920 the area had become a partially landscaped garden for Appleton House, a purpose-built Rest Home. The arrangement of the grounds was designed for psychotherapeutic reasons, permitting walking, games and picnicking. As well as the remains of the modern landscape garden features, cartographic sources indicated remnants of medieval ridge and furrow. No areas of certain ancient woodland were identified.

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- Gazetteer entry number for investigation: Each investigation entry for the 1999 Gazetteer volume has a unique individual number with two elements: the Gazetteer Section Number in which the investigation record is contained and a serial number. These numbers should be used to enable the location of each investigation within the volume using the author, investigator and period/dating indexes provided at the end of the Gazetteer volume.
- *Archaeological Investigation Project* database reference number for the relevant investigation record (for internal *AIP* use only)
- National Grid Reference: An eight figure grid reference prefixed by the relevant National Grid letters has been recorded where provided in the reports, etc. accessed.
- Site/project name and location: The name of the site or development project, giving some indication of its location, is given.
- Report title : The full title of the report relating to the investigation is given.; in the case of an "unpublished" monograph-type report of the kind illustrated this may include an internal report number, if recorded. Square brackets are used to indicate either that the title has been "made-up" by a member of the project team because the document referenced lacked a formal title, or that a document with the title given (or something closely approximating to it) is known to exist but was not actually inspected by a member of the project team.
- Other publication details: Normally comprises the name of the organisation/individual responsible for authoring or editing the report, followed by the place of issue/publication, the name of the organisation

responsible for issue/publication, the year of issue/publication and a description of the physical format of the document including the total number of pages, and the presence of figures, tables, plates etc. (see abbreviations for codes used). Occasionally, where the report represents an article in a published monograph or serial, or where a summary abstract has been obtained from a 'secondary source' and the original report has not been seen, the name of the originator of the article, monograph, or summary note will be given followed by a 'Source Number', the relevant page, and a description of the content of the article/summary note (presence of figures, plates, tables etc.). The 1999 project did not encounter any instances of this.

The site and its immediate environs appeared to have been developed between 1835 and 1852. The development included terraced housing, shops and public houses, a brass foundry and a timber yard, a Methodist chapel, a gasometer and two schools, the gasometer was replaced in 1879. The site was partially redeveloped in the 1930s with a new road laid out along the western boundary. The 1840s buildings were all demolished by 1968 with the 1879 school having been demolished after 1987. Geotechnical investigations suggested that there was the potential for the survival of 19th century archaeological remains in Area 1, whereas Area 2 contained substantial areas of made ground. Finally, the archaeology of the Garden City as a monument in its own right should not be overlooked. While remains of recent date were not generally considered in developments of this nature, the international significance of Letchworth Garden City made the careful recording of remains from its early years an important element in preserving the archaeology of the site, if only by record. Although football pitches were established on the plateau at the top of the hill, the park remained largely

undeveloped. A shelter was added in 1911, but it was not until 1939 that the Bowling Green and some landscaping were added to the facilities on the lower part of the park. Two heavy guns presented to the park in 1910 were later melted down, and only the wooden mounting of one gun survives in the park. The park has been associated with the Accrington Pals battalion. A desk-based assessment of the potential impact of the proposed Crosby Well upon archaeological remains was prepared. The exploratory well was to be located in Liverpool Bay, c.16km west of Southport, off the Lancashire coast. In order to provide archaeological context for the desk-based assessment a Study Area, consisting of a buffer zone with a two kilometre radius around the well site, was created. The resulting data was then filtered to focus on sites that lay within the Study Area. Any remaining data was used, along with the information from secondary sources, to inform a wider assessment of the archaeological potential of the area. This report set out the methodology employed in carrying out the study and an account of the policy and legal framework pertaining to archaeological sites and wrecks in the United Kingdom. The historic environment was discussed, and a baseline of the archaeological evidence of the area from the Palaeolithic to the modern period was included. In summary, the known and potential archaeology within the Study Area around Crosby Well consisted of one wreck and four obstructions charted by the United Kingdom Hydrographic Office, five obstructions recorded in the National Monuments Record, six geophysical anomalies identified during and archaeological assessment of sidescan data, documented losses [for which there were no known seabed remains] that may have lain within the Study Area, unknown and undocumented wrecks from various periods, possibly dating back to the Mesolithic, stray finds of ship-borne debris from various periods, and the potential for the presence of submerged prehistoric finds and prehistoric land surfaces. The archaeological potential of the Study Area was considered to be generally low. There was potential for prehistoric exploitation of landscapes that later became submerged. In addition, the area was part of an important trade route along the coast that had been in use from at least the Iron Age to the present, therefore the discovery of further wrecks was possible. The study was required to inform design proposals for improvements to the River Douglas, which flows immediately to the east of the site. The origins of Sutton Mill were unclear, and whilst the possibility that the site was occupied by a fulling mill during the medieval period cannot be discounted, firm evidence was lacking. Sutton Mill was first depicted on a plan of c. 1712, and on William Yates' Survey of the County Palatine of Lancaster, which was published in 1786. Later, more detailed mapping, shows it as a rectangular structure with two additional out buildings, and an associated weir across the River Douglas. References to a corn mill on Coppull Lane in 19th century trade directories occur from 1828 onwards. In trade directories from 1881 and 1887, and an almanac from 1889, Thomas Charlson was listed as the miller at Sunon Mill. Charlson was the leading corn dealer in Wigan at this time and, by 1889, owned at least three mills in the area. However, although his business continued into the early 1900s, Sutton Mill is not mentioned in trade directories after 1889. By 1909, the mill had been converted for use as a farm. The farm was occupied by the Leather family in the late-1920s, when it formed part of the Bottling Wood Unhealthy Area, outlined for clearance by the Insanitary Houses and Conversions Committee of Wigan Borough Council. In total, 64 properties were demolished as part of this clearance scheme. Most of the old houses in the designated Unhealthy Area, including Sutton Mill, were demolished in 1927-8, although the last property, the Woodman Inn, remained until 1932. There was no surviving above ground remains of the mill, although it was likely that elements of the water-management system, including the waterwheel pit, may survive as buried structures. Important evidence of Roman occupation had been discovered in central Wigan, the most significant as recently as 2005, although evidence from the site was limited to one bronze coin. The potential for the discovery of deposits from these periods was considered low. Little was known of Wigan during the early medieval period. No material remains were known to exist and evidence of occupation was limited only to place-name evidence. Similarly, the potential for the discovery of remains and deposits at the site was low. During the construction phase of the proposed development there would be direct impacts to archaeological deposits at the northern end of the development area. These included potential Roman settlement remains, medieval back yard deposits and burgage plot boundaries and early 19th century workers housing and yard services. These were identified in previous evaluation trenches as well as excavation areas undertaken during the 1980s. It was anticipated that archaeological remains would be preserved in situ beneath a new landscaped piazza, whilst those deposits situated close to the Municipal Building would be impacted by the construction of the new development. As much of this area had already been extensively truncated by previous archaeological excavations, mine stabilisation works, 19th and 20th century buildings, modern utilities and an electricity substation, the archaeology was fragmentary between major intrusions and therefore considered of low importance. The impact of the new development upon the remaining archaeological deposits in this area was assessed as Major without mitigation. After mitigation, no further residual impacts were

anticipated during the operation of the development scheme. Slight/ moderate adverse and neutral to slight adverse effects were assessed on seven archaeology receptors of low value within the development area. The scheme would not have an impact upon built heritage receptors after mitigation, the majority would experience a slight adverse effect arising from the development, principally reflecting likely changes to the streetscape setting of Library Street and Mill gate. Changes to the streetscape setting would have an overall slight adverse effect upon the Wigan Town Centre Conservation Plan, but the conservation area was already characterised by a number of modern buildings interspersed with older structures. Although the Wigan Town Centre Conservation Area included a number of buildings of local historic interest, only one such building was identified as experiencing a direct impact, from the scheme. This was 17-19 The Mend, which was to be demolished as part of the development. A further building would experience a neutral to slight adverse effect arising from the development. The Municipal Building, Hewlett Street, would experience a moderate to large adverse effect as much of the building would be demolished and a new structure erected behind the retained principal facades. A desk-based assessment concluded that there was only a low potential for prehistoric and Romano-British remains being exposed by any groundwork within All Saints Church cemetery. However, it was noted that Middle Bronze Age, Late Iron Age and Romano-British deposits were uncovered unexpectedly during building work at St. Thomas-A-Becket Church in Pagham, the possibility of similar types of discoveries being made at All Saints Church could not be discounted. The proposed toilet and kitchen facilities at the church were to be constructed at or on the current floor level. However, it was possible that the limited opening up of the floor for drainage connection in the corner of the aisle would reveal archaeological features related to a postulated earlier Saxon and/ or Norman church at the site. More likely though, was the discovery of previously unrecorded structural features, funerary monuments, human remains, other cut features, layers and artefacts associated with the 15th century building. It was worthy of note that two 15th century windows located within the north aisle would not be impacted upon directly by the intended redevelopment. Evidence suggested three to ten 19th century interments commemorated by wall plaques, could lie within the footprint of the proposed internal reordering. The precise location, depth and character of these burials had not been ascertained. It was possible that they were associated with significant in-situ funerary structures such as vaults/tombs. The effects of subsidence, combined with the gradient of the hillside could cause significant damage to both this Scheduled Monument and the associated Roman earthworks. An evaluation consisting of two linear trial trenches was undertaken from the 28th of August to the 2nd September 2008. Both trenches were positioned to abut the north curtain wall, in order to assess the depth and condition of the foundations at specific points along the wall's course. Archaeological deposits (comprising three distinct archaeological horizons), and the foundations of the north curtain wall were encountered in both trenches. In Trench 1 the evenly coursed foundations were observed at a depth of approximately 0.9m from the current ground level, and were vertically faced. No finds were recovered from this trench. In Trench 2 the foundations were observed to a depth of approximately 0.6m from the current ground level and were also vertically faced. Within the middle of the section of the wall was observed an area which seemingly represented a rebuild phase as the coursing became uneven and irregular. Animal bone was recovered from the trench and was retained for further analysis. Tumble was recorded within the upper horizons of the trench, within which was a stone observed to have decorative moulding on both sides. The evaluation at Brough Castle revealed that the foundations of the north curtain wall were present to a depth of between 0.6m and 0.9m below the current ground level. Within trench 1 was noted the presence of an offset belonging to part of a possible 13th century buttress. However, within both Trench 1 and Trench 2 no offset was observed to the foundation, and within Trench 2 there was evidence of a phase of rebuilding. It was possible that these related to rebuilding of the wall in 1245, as well as the construction of latrines in the 17th century. The evaluation also revealed that the angle of repose between the foundations of the wall and the gradient of the slope below was less than 45 degrees which suggested that damage to the castle and its associated earthworks was likely to be accelerated if no intervention occurred. The findings of the evaluation suggested that a mitigation strategy to stabilise or repair the north curtain wall should be implemented in order to prevent further damage of the northern parts of the castle wall, and the Roman earthworks associated with it. The assessment identified good potential for preservation of organic remains associated with accumulation of the peats. This sequence had the potential to provide detailed information on vegetation and sea-level change from the late Mesolithic period onwards. Previous studies had noted that early prehistoric utilisation of the Pevensey Levels was associated with episodes of marine regression. The organic deposits identified during this assessment had the potential to contain evidence of prehistoric activity in the form of artefacts, wooden trackways or platforms and boats. The organic deposits and any archaeological remains therein were vulnerable to both direct impacts through the digging of drainage ditches or secondary impacts such as the lowering of the water-table. The natural shallow embayment's of the island were likely a

significant factor in the growth of salt working in this area. Abandonment of the village was most likely partly due to a decline in the salt works. This was in part due to the declining economy and the spread of disease in the late-13th to 14th centuries. However, these affects were probably significantly exacerbated at Northeye by the storms of the late-13th century which likely infilled most of the embayments which were used in salt production. The village never appeared to recover from these events and was subsequently abandoned. Significant early salt working sites and other medieval features such as jetties may be found around the edges of the Northeye Island. Such discoveries could help inform about the activities associated with the medieval village. An evaluation was carried out at Brewer Street, Oxford. It revealed deeply stratified clay rich deposits which may have represented fills of the pre-conquest configuration of a branch of the Thames, subsequently known as the Trill Mill Stream. Overlying and also to the north of these possible fills were a series of deposits, which may have correlated to the deliberate deposition of material along the interface between the Thames floodplain and the second gravel terrace to the north, upon which was located the medieval walled town of Oxford. This process of "land reclamation" had been identified elsewhere along the edge of the second terrace, in particular during recent archaeological work at the Westgate car park to the west of Brewer Street, where the reclamation deposits were dated to the 12th-13th centuries. The dating evidence from the deposits encountered during the evaluation at Brewer Street suggested that these dated to the 13th-14th century. Consequently, if the interpretation of these deposits is valid, then the process appeared to be later at Brewer Street, possibly suggesting that the reclamation of land was by no means synchronous between all the sites where it has been identified. A possible pit and a north-south aligned linear feature truncated these deposits in the south of the investigation area. The function of the pit was unclear, although it may relate to a tenement plot fronting on to Brewer Street. The function of the linear feature was also unclear but it was possible that it formed a drainage channel running from the town to the Trill Mill Stream. Overlying the fills of these two features was a series of imported garden soils, which were possibly contemporary with the construction of the existing buildings fronting on to Brewer Street in the 17th century. In the north of the investigation area the land reclamation deposits were truncated by a north-south aligned limestone wall, a similarly aligned ceramic drainage pipe, and a 20th-century brick built inspection pit; associated with the use of the current building as a garage. The date of the limestone wall was uncertain, as it had been truncated to the west by the trench for the ceramic pipe, and to the east by what appeared to be a 19th-century pit. However, to the north of the wall, a potentially contemporary compacted gravel surface produced 14th-15th century roof tile. The wall also appeared to have been modified, possibly in the 19th century, by the addition of a chute, the function of which was

unclear. Despite the uncertainties with regard to the date of this structure, it seemed likely that the wall related to the cellar of a building which formerly fronted onto Brewer Street. [Au(abr)]

Between September 2007 and February 2008 an archaeological evaluation at The Westgate Centre, Oxford was carried out. This phase of evaluation [Phase 2] followed on from the Phase 1 evaluation carried out in 2006. Phase 2 comprised a further 19 trenches, 7 within the multi-storey car park and 5 in the surface car parks, with a further 7 in areas adjacent to the car parks which would be affected by the proposed development. The evaluation largely confirmed the results of the first phase, although the additional data recovered allowed the site specific model for the hydrological and sedimentary development of the floodplain to be refined. This model still correlated broadly with the sequence postulated from previous excavations to the south of the medieval walled town, and elsewhere on the floodplain of the Upper Thames. Evidence for an elevated area of gravel to the south-east of the site suggested that this area was on the periphery of an "island" of higher ground, although the nature and elevation of the deposits encountered implied that this was marginal land, and unlikely to be the focus of settlement similar to that previously excavated at Whitehouse Road. The evaluation provided confirmation of the Trill Mill Stream crossing the centre of the site, and further evidence for the origin, development and orientation of the channel was recovered. In addition, the results from a number of trenches suggested the existence of a complex system of intercutting side channels [some timber lined] to the south of the stream. One of these comprised a set of substantial timber beams which were encountered in previous investigations, and have been interpreted as part of a mill race. Demolition material overlying these timbers was suggestive of an adjacent mill associated with the Greyfriars priory to the north-east. There was also some evidence for managed water courses between the Trill Mill Stream and the Thames, which may have been contemporary with the Greyfriars' ownership of this area of the site, referred to in documentary sources as Boteham Island. Additional evidence for 13th-14th century land reclamation extending southwards from the second terrace was also revealed. Further robbed and partially robbed walls associated with the Priory and its subsequent demolition were seen to cut this deposit, as was a possible western boundary to the Greyfriars complex, comprising a north-south aligned ditch, later superseded by a limestone wall. The latter appeared to correspond to the boundary between the Priory complex and the area known as Paradise to the west. The remaining recorded deposits appeared to relate to the use of the area as gardens/pasture, and subsequently the construction of Victorian terraced housing and the demolition of same in the late-1960s. A small evaluation trench was subsequently dug across part of the keep. The evaluation added to information gathered previously by revealing the north-eastern corner of the keep and also the supporting pier for the first floor of the castle within the interior. The remains of the heavily robbed gatehouse and main access road into the castle complex and the northern moat were identified, as well as a heavily robbed structure interpreted as a chapel. The remains of a medieval ancillary building were also revealed. These structures post-dated deposits containing 11th/12th century pottery, consistent with an early post-conquest construction date, which could link it with Hugh of Buckland, the local major landowner around the turn of the 12th century. Possible evidence of the subsequent strengthening of the keep was observed, perhaps associated with Matilda's fortification of the castle during the Anarchy Period. The abandonment of the castle complex was dated to the late 13th/early 14th century, and there was a clear hiatus in the pottery sequence from that date until the 16th century, which fits with the later occupation of the Site by the de Besilles family. In the mid-17th century a "minor Royalist fort" was constructed that

involved the refortification of the eastern half of the medieval moated complex by the excavation of a large ditch which split the moated site in two. The 17th century defensive ditch was shown to surround an earthen bastion for the placing of cannon. Several late Roman ditches, possibly field boundaries, were also identified, as well as a low level of residual later prehistoric material, suggesting activity on or close to the site. The route of the medieval road from Faringdon to Witney, which apparently ran through the site, was also investigated, but no trace of the road was found. [Au(abr)]

However, masonry walls probably did survive in the vicinity of the trench. The Roman sewer was located in Trench 6, outside of the area of the 1974 excavation and was comparable in size and character to the portions excavated in 1974. The Roman sewer survived below the level of the natural in the north-west corner of the site and continued north-west beyond the site. In this area other Roman and medieval negative features were recorded cut into natural, but the overlying later deposits had been removed by the construction of the existing car park in the 1970s. Similarly no archaeological deposits were identified in Trenches 1, 7 and 8 located in the car park perimeter bank. There was also a window, or loading door at first floor level in the south west gable but the original opening had been reduced, the lintel raised, presumably to accommodate another later, possibly single storey building to the south east, now removed. The stable abutted the earlier two storey northern portion, which had been recently truncated and the fabric of which contained no brick and had a single large opening at ground floor level in the north- west elevation. The north end of the north- west wall was formerly the right hand jam of an opening. There was one remaining roof truss in this portion with bolted joints. The north- east wall at the north end contained a small four light window and a blocked door. There was not enough of this building remaining to give a definite idea of the original function. The archaeological evaluation comprised the excavation of four trenches. It revealed evidence predominantly from the 19th century use of the site as a garden. The exceptions were a north-south linear in the base of Trench 2 which may be an earlier field division and an east-west linear in Trench 5. Trench 1 contained 19th - 20th century artefacts with a few sherds of medieval coarseware. The only features were two modern postholes. Trench 2 contained sherds of medieval and post-medieval pottery and a linear feature. The full depth was not investigated as it lay below the level of the full depth of the groundworks required by the development and the width could not be determined as it was truncated by modern disturbance to the west of the trench. This feature may be associated with the former western boundary of Area A . Trench 3 contained no features, except a 0.4m wide concrete, brick and stone wall on the former site of a modern building. Trench 4 was 0.2m deep at the north- east end due to the masonry immediately below the surface consisting of a length of lime mortared stone rubble wall 0.4m in width, which aligned with similar masonry to the south-west . The slight splay in the gap between the two suggested an entrance. Parallel [to the north-west] lay another portion of clay bonded wall of variable width. This work provided an assessment of the condition of the overflow structure and the preservation of its current status by record. The remains of the overspill sluice were typical of 18th century water management in the East Midlands. The overspill device, in contrast to the use of manually operated sluice gates, reduced the need for monitoring of the water levels and the loss of fish when the water levels were reduced. The raising of fish for the household was likely to have been a primary function of the ponds prior to their incorporation into a planned woodland garden. This was perhaps demonstrated by their labelling as fish ponds on Cust's estate plan of 1800. The assessment and recording of the overspill sluice demonstrated that its structural integrity had been severely compromised by the effects of water erosion. Much of the western overspill structure had been severely undermined and the culvert and tail race beds were all but destroyed. 19th century attempts to consolidate the tail race were also clearly inadequate and had succumbed to the considerable forces generated by the outflow. The settlement was situated within a rectilinear enclosure system directly adjacent to the river Ivel. Two excavation areas were opened uncovering a complex sequence of enclosures and other features. A complex sequence of driveway ditches and hollow ways formed an entrance to the settlement from the south-west inferring a degree of continuity. At the south-west corner of the settlement core a complex sequence of boundary and other features were discovered, including an annular ditch. The function of this feature remained enigmatic; it would have formed a substantial earthwork at the entrance to the settlement. The extensive recutting of the enclosure ditches and the complex interplay between ditches, river channels and possible terraces clearly demonstrated that the inhabitants went to some trouble to maintain their settlement close to a channel of the River Ivel. It may be presumed from this, that close proximity to the channel was desirable, a possible explanation is that they were using the river as a source of water and for transport. The latest diagnostic Roman pottery recovered consisted of only two sherds dated to the 3rd or 4th century. Similar results were obtained from an earlier excavation in the southern haul road. The settlement may have been no longer viable in its position next to the river due to environmental changes leading to increasingly wetland conditions. This was evidenced on site by the number of ditches and other features which became the foci for the formation of peaty deposits in the latest phase of the settlement. The excavation produced no evidence for activity in the Saxon or medieval periods. Earlier phases of excavation in extraction phases 1b and 2 showed Saxon occupation occurred further west, away from the river. A small amount of evidence for the post-medieval/modern use of the site was found in the form of a boundary ditch and small rectangular pits. Previous evaluation and excavation work indicated that the western margin of the Ivel Farm site had been subject to quarrying. The Downs were rich in archaeology dating from the Palaeolithic period to 20th century military remains. Two Scheduled Ancient Monuments lay at the north end of the scarp in close proximity to the multi-user route: the Five Knolls Bronze Age barrow cemetery [SAM 20422] and a pair of medieval pillow mounds [SAM 24409]. Located at the north end of the Downs and within the course of the multi-user route were a series of previously unrecorded linear earthworks, mostly aligned north to south. Following on from two earlier phases of investigation at the St. John's Triangle site, nine trenches, covering a combined total of 41 square metres, were excavated within a 0.3 hectare area of land located in the centre of the historic core of Cambridge. In addition, a further ten areas of watching brief, covering a combined total of 147.44 square metres, were also monitored. The investigations primarily targeted backyard areas situated to the rear of the main frontage properties. tap slag suggested that the site retained its association, though to a much lesser degree, with iron smelting activity. Activity related to the pottery industry was represented by four pottery kilns, a T-shaped drying oven, a workshop with a heated room for drying, and a second related building. The driveway was also modified at this time, with the erection of a line of posts which would have restricted access to [and visibility of] the production site, and the recutting of its ditches so as to modify access to its south-easterly branch. The kilns were thought to have been abandoned at about the same time. Archaeomagnetic dating of one of them set this date as c. AD 250. Phase 4 represented the demolition of the pottery production site, which seemed to have been deliberately levelled, in the late 3rd to 4th century. Further features of this date contained significant quantities of iron smelting slag, indicating intensified industrial activity probably focused to the south and/or south-west of the pottery production site, outside of the excavated area. Phase 2 excavation of a barrow on Peacehaven Heights took place in 2008. The barrow was located very close to the cliff edge and would shortly be lost to cliff erosion. The north-west quadrant of the mound was the focus of the excavations. Earlier excavations of this same quadrant in 2007 revealed that the mound had been used during World War II for military purposes. Two slit trenches had been dug by soldiers into the centre effectively removing large quantities of the interior of the earthworks. The trenches were part of the coastal defences used to protect the radar station that once stood adjacent to the mound. The excavations revealed that the large mound (evident in 2008) covered a smaller mound with an approximate 8m radius. This comprised layers of local sandy/clay deposits as well as flint [both worked and unworked], pebbles and pieces of sandstone. Around three thousand pieces of worked flint and waste flint flakes were collected for analysis. The flint work was of mixed period, Mesolithic, Neolithic and Bronze Age, and included scrapers, piercers, blades, cores, an axe rough-out and a possible Neolithic arrowhead. Some 40 sherds of pottery were also recovered, most of which were prehistoric. Some were of typical Bronze Age fabric with some possibly being Beaker. Other sherds were probably Iron Age and Roman. The excavation failed to produce any evidence for a central burial, but a sherd of green glazed pottery deep in the centre along with two pieces of clay pipe in the layers above it suggested the centre of the barrow has been disturbed, probably by Antiquarian robbers from the 1700-1800s. The robber trench probably corresponded with one of the craters in the mound just beyond the excavated area. Beyond this intrusion and below the flint layers a number of small pits were found containing burnt stone, charcoal and pot sherds. Although no cremated bone appeared to have survived, these were probable cremation pits. Pottery and charcoal was taken from these features for dating. A number of stake and post holes were also revealed adjacent to and around the pits, which possibly indicated grave markers or some other funerary or earlier structure. To date only one quadrant had been excavated, so further excavation would be needed to have the full plan of these features. Several soil samples were removed for further investigation along with several, small charcoal samples. No ring ditch was evident but shallow scoops had been removed from the clay in an area where the ditch might be expected. The clay was difficult to excavate with modern metal tools and it may have proved too difficult for the barrow builders to dig a ring ditch. The evidence suggested that they brought in soil from the surrounding area instead and they made a mound from that. Initial analysis suggested the finds would confirm this to be a Bronze Age funerary monument. [Au(adp)]

Both the WRTS site and the proposed development sit within the area of the removed hill face and any archaeological remains in this area, including possible palaeoenvironmental remains will have been destroyed. A watching brief was undertaken on a small rear extension to Garden Cottage. The area was a designated Archaeological Sensitive Area as it formed the historic core of the Saxon, medieval and post- medieval village of Alciston. During the medieval period the manor and village was held by Battle Abbey and was used as an agricultural grange. Remnants of this use survive at Alciston Court to the south of the church, were there was a medieval tithe barn

and dovecote. The post-medieval village [and possibly the medieval village] was a typical ribbon settlement, lining an important droveway linking the South Downs with the low Weald. The "village street" section of this droveway would have been fronted by a series of property plots, each containing a domestic building and ancillary agricultural/industrial structures. Elements of these buildings and property plots still survived in the village, such as the Old Clergy House adjacent to Garden Cottage. The extant building on the site had its origins in the 1920s. The foundation trenches revealed a garden soil varying in depth, being generally deeper further away from the present building. This increase in depth suggested that the garden soil partly comprised made ground, redeposited during the original construction of Garden Cottage. There was no obvious sign of the former land surface within this layer. A number of artefacts were recovered comprising mainly post-medieval ceramic building material, an undatable lead weight, a post-medieval livery button, and a single sherd of mid-late Saxon pottery. Below the garden soil lay the natural geology. No cut features were observed within this context. Use of a metal detector recovered a medieval copper alloy ring brooch from the garden of the house. The watching brief was useful in recovering a number of artefacts relating to Alciston's history. The mid-late Saxon sherd confirmed the occupation of the village during this period, a hypothesis that had previously only been supported by the style and date of the place name and its mention in the Domesday Book. It was surprising given the proximity of known medieval/post-medieval houses that artefacts of this period were not recovered from the foundation trenches. This lack of material [other than the medieval brooch] raised the possibility that either this was an empty plot during these periods or the occupation area lay closer to the road. [Au(abr)]

Groundworks comprised removing an old concrete base, reducing the ground level on the southern side and the digging of foundation trenches. In the area of the ground reduction, the ground appeared was disturbed or redeposited and contained a small assemblage of 19th/20th century tile and animal bone. The area of the removed concrete slab revealed a partially disturbed sandy clay mixed with beach pebble, the pebble was hardcore below the former slab. The foundation trenches within the slab area was above a subsoil or natural geology. No archaeological features or deposits were recorded within the development area. The builders recovered a single late medieval pot sherd from the base of a test pit dug in the ground reduction area. Two 20th century earthenware pot sherds were recovered from the spoil heap. It was likely that the ground surface on the site of the garage and the adjacent area had been raised at some point, most likely with spoil extracted during the construction of Little

As the boundary coincided with a distinct break in the distribution of Middle Saxon features, it may suggest that it perpetuated a much earlier boundary. The southern concentration was dominated by an imposing post-built timber structure. It was constructed of eight pairs of outer wall posts set into pits up to 0.80m deep, several of which preserved their original post impressions. A distinctive feature which sets the Lyminge structure apart from the mainstream tradition of Anglo-Saxon timber construction was a longitudinal alignment of posts creating two aisles, these were out of alignment with the outer wall posts raising the possibility that this feature was a later structural modification, although it could be regarded as primary, especially if an upper storey is envisaged. This building was stratigraphically contemporary with an exterior yard surface, which comprised a metalling of crushed flint compressed into prepared chalk. Fragments of animal bone and iron slag were incorporated into the metalling, whilst an adjacent pit was found to contain a mass of flint nodules. Hollowed areas within the surface were filled by occupation deposits yielding domestic material including middle Saxon imported pottery, ironwork and animal bone. Whilst the metalling was cut by several pits of middle Saxon date, no earlier features were discovered beneath portions lifted for sampling. Bearing in mind its connection with a building with barn-like affinities, it was not unreasonable to suggest that this metalled surface could have served the function of a threshing floor. Two further structural elements were found in close proximity to the two-aisled building. The first was a small sunken featured building with a classic gable post pairing along the longitudinal axis of the pit. Cutting across the floor plan of the two-aisled building was a long section of wall-trench. Its progress was interrupted by several intercutting pits, some stratigraphically earlier and others later. It was impossible to know whether this was an isolated feature, perhaps the portion of a timber palisade, or part of a more complex structure severely attenuated by plough truncation. The remaining features in Trench 1 comprised some 35 pits of both sub-circular and sub-rectangular form, the most impressive of which had neatly cut cylindrical profiles extending to a depth of nearly 2m. Preliminary impressions indicated that the range embraced the storage of foodstuffs, cess and rubbish disposal. Whilst middle Saxon occupation in the form of pits and ditches extended across the area, the archaeology in Trench 2 was distinct for its lack of structural evidence. The most substantial ditch was found to be of two distinct phases, the later representing a continuation of one of the minor, post-medieval, field boundaries traced in the corner of Trench 1; the earlier phase, dated to the Middle Saxon period. The 34 pits discovered in Trench 2 were arranged in distinct clusters separated by sterile areas of chalk. Their morphological range was similar to that encountered in Trench 1. Another divergence was the presence of pits with short adjoining gulleys which hinted at a more specialised usage potentially connected with agricultural processing or light industrial activity. It was therefore certainly the foundation of a wall springing north away from the north-east corner of the tower, presumably that of the north part of the west end of the now vanished nave. The wall extended to the full depth of the trench and was left in situ as it formed the east terminal of the French drain trench. No intact graves, tombs or crypts were revealed. A few small fragments of disarticulated bone were recovered for re-interment. The deposits through which this trench was dug appeared to have occurred as a single incidence of dumping raising the ground level against the north side of the tower. The construction of Becca Banks monument marked the end of the use of the features, as the bank material, upcast from the excavation of the ditch, was found partially infilling and sealing them. Shortly after the construction of Becca Banks monument, the hillside above the open ditch collapsed into it via a landslide that involved a staggered, or stepped, series of soil blocks shearing off from the hillside and into the ditch. Also at some point after the construction a series of field boundary ditches was set out. These were found to contain Romano-British artefacts, and their spatial configuration suggested that they post-dated Becca Banks. Two pits also contained Romano-British artefacts were found on the site. One of these cut the remains of Becca Banks earthwork. These pits were sealed by a layer of colluviums that accumulated against the side of Becca Banks earthwork. Following the landslide, the ditch continued to infill via more conventional means, until it was full and level with the surrounding land surface to the south. The infilled ditch became used for arable agriculture at this time, and the scarp slope that the monument utilised represented a field boundary. This was used as a rubbish dump in the 19th to 20th centuries, to judge by the large amounts of modern material recovered from it. At some point in the 20th century, probably the 1940s, the upstanding remains of Becca Banks' bank were pulled or bulldozed to the south to level out the scarp slope that the monument followed. The field boundary that Becca Banks had hitherto formed was erased, and the single large field that existed currently was created. The rudimentary construction of Becca Banks, the fact that it was built over existing enclosures, and its rather unstable nature, were taken to suggest that it was conceived under emergency conditions and erected in a hurried manner. These conclusions supported earlier interpretations that the monument was a native British response to the arrival of the Romans in the south of the country. Such a model would suggest a mid to late first century AD date range for the construction of the monument. This was in accordance with the Late Iron Age to Early Roman date suggested by the artefactual and stratigraphic dating evidence, although this evidence was, at this preliminary stage, somewhat tentative. Saddleworth, economically marginal, was eager to exploit its water resources. Before 1791, the absent Lord exploited constraining manorial rights on water and permits to build watermills, while freeholders pushed to exploit their resources. After the 1791 manor break-up, tenants became freeholders, free to build watermills, but a sizable prospering group rose

The building from the late 19th century had the appearance of the typical kit type building popular at the time. Locally Boulton & Paul of Norwich were the best known but John Sadd of Maldon also produced similar buildings. Many were seen covered in corrugated iron and it was about these that most had been written. The manufacturers name, if on the building, was usually somewhere within the structure. The addition of a porch, decorated gables, the transverse "transept feature" type gables and fine ashlar lined finishing, replicating stone, to the lime render provided a customisation to make the building stand out as something different. An example of a similar building but finished to a lower standard could be found re-erected at the East Anglian Museum of Rural Life. This building originally erected at Great Moulton in Norfolk was built by Boulton & Paul in the 1890s for £105-18s-0d. It had an original side extension but was finished in corrugated iron with minimum detailing. Of special interest were the vertical sliding, sash windows that have three vertical panes over three as at High Roding, and also that the panes in the lower sash were obscure glass. As the church is a considerable distance from the village one can see a need to provide a closer place of Worship and the small scale reflected the village size. In towns it was very different with places such as Halstead having a new 19th century church at the other end of the town that actually rivalled the original in size and impact. It was mainly the non-conformist religions that made use of these small prefabricated timber mission halls and chapels to house the dramatic increase in the number of worshipers during the Victorian era. They were cheap and efficient in providing a good open area of building and the companies producing them sent them all over the world. Documentary sources for this building had proved, on the searches made, to be non-existent and the only firm detail was the notice on the front door relating Mission Hall. Moulded timber corbel blocks were attached to the posts. The gable front had the same design of scalloped pierced barge board as the main roof. [Au]

It was a two-storey L-shaped structure comprising a 3-bay south range, which was originally a cross passage house, to which a late-15th/early 16th century range had been added. Later extensions included a single storey range to the east elevation, an outshut to the west elevation and an L-shaped addition in the north-west corner of the building. Little of the timber frame was visible from the outside as the house was partially encased in brick in the 19th century. Other parts of the building were tile hung or weather boarded. The interior of the building, however, retained much of the original layout and many timbers had been left exposed. The house was part of a large complex now functioning as an equestrian centre. The complex of agricultural buildings at Drinkstone Hall was a self-contained, single-build 'model farm' of the mid-19th century which represented a well-preserved and historically important example of its type. The farm lay to the south of a medieval moat which probably marked the site of the main Domesday manor, held by the Abbot of Ely and still the centre of a substantial 287 acre tenanted estate at the time of the tithe survey in 1838. The scattered traditional farm buildings of 1838 were demolished and replaced on the same site with the present unified complex in the 1850s or possibly the 1860s. It consisted of a timber framed and pantiled barn with twin porches and a continuous, skirt-like lean-to roofed with slate which extended eastwards to form a pair of sheds enclosing two cattle yards. The yards were divided by a central range containing back-to-back shelter sheds separated by an axial partition. Each of the three yard ranges terminated in a brick gable with carved, Mock-Tudor barge boards and doors to enclosed storage sheds. The Tudor brick building known as Abbey Farm Barn was marked on the Ordnance Surveys of 1905 and 1926 as the 'remains of a chapel'. The Schedule of Listed Buildings describes it as 'a former ecclesiastical building of unknown function' dating from c. 1500 and used as a house from the mid-16th century and as a barn from the 18th century (the structure was Listed at Grade II). The building had also been interpreted as a Tudor stable block, and a malting house. An inventory of Eye priory taken in 1536, included a 'Bakhous and Brewe hous' among its buildings, and another of 1650 refers to a 'malting and brewing house'.

Large, detached service buildings known as 'bakehouses and brewhouses' were standard features on monastic and other high-status sites in the Middle Ages. The majority of monastic examples were destroyed in the wake of the Reformation, and Abbey Farm Barn represented the finest and best-preserved of just four known survivors in England (the others being at Lindisfarne, Norwich and Canterbury). As such, it was of exceptional historic importance and merited Listing at Grade II* or Grade I. The brickwork and carpentry details indicated a date in the late-15th or early 16th century but the narrow window arches were in the style of the 13th century and may have deliberately reflected the medieval buildings of the priory church and cloister. The eastern elevation, in contrast, was provided with only a small number of windows in the usual style of the period. The interior contained a low granary or malting loft along most of its length, but a substantial area against its southern gable remained open to the roof but apparently possessed one or more platforms or galleries (as found in several domestic Tudor brewhouses elsewhere in Suffolk). The walls of this open area contained a variety of niches, drains and recesses. The inventory of 1536 lists several great vats which probably occupied this space, and archaeological evidence of furnaces and ovens was likely to remain intact beneath the present floor. The fire-backs were unusual features, and the nature of the structures to which they belonged was impossible to determine without excavation. The building was converted into stabling and cattle accommodation during the 18th century, which resulted in considerable mutilation to the eastern elevation but left the western façade largely intact. The roof and ceiling were replaced following a fire in c. 1900, but three original binding joists still survived. Abbey Farm Barn never operated as a barn in the normal sense of the term, and belonged to a priory rather than an Abbey, but this misunderstood structure was among the most precious monastic survivals in Britain, and offered a unique opportunity to understand the mechanics of medieval brewing and baking. The 19th century brick façade of the grade II-listed farmhouse concealed a timber-framed structure of the early-17th century which preserved its original internal layout with a central hall flanked on the north by a cross-passage and twin service rooms and on the south by a chimney and parlour. The bunker was designed to contain all useful items in the event of nuclear attack. Beyond the essentials of the control room, the plant room provided emergency power, ventilation and filtration. The facilities for basic human needs were also present, comprising a kitchen, dormitories and lavatories for men and women. The condition of the shelter varied. The basic concrete structure was very solid, with walls over 0.62m thick. The weak points were the entrances, which allowed water in, which contributed to damp. The interior wall finishes were suffering wet rot, particularly partition walls, boarded surfaces over concrete and ceiling panels. Any wooden or rubber elements had an advanced state of mould. The brick wall may have had a practical function in allowing for the retention and radiation of heat for glasshouses located against it. The majority of fire damage was concentrated to upper floors, with the rest of the building affected by subsequent water inundation. 20/22 Dale Street was clearly of importance (it is included in the statutory list of Buildings of Special Architectural or Historic Interest). It was however notable that it was identified for its group value, and the combined contribution it made together with a range of other buildings on Dale Street. Ivy House was a two-storey mid to late-18th century house with cellar and attic rooms built in Georgian style with a two-storey rear wing. Throughout the 19th century and for most of the 20th century the property was known as Astmoor Farmhouse. In the late-18th century the Tannery and Astmoor Farm appeared to have been constructed. The depression of the 1930s may have aided the demise of the farm. By 1937, the Tannery had expanded north and housing developed along the north side of Marsh Lane. During this period, the farmhouse may have been renamed as Ivy House and split into 1a and 3a Marsh Lane. The closure of Astmoor Tannery in 1962 signified major changes. In 1964 Runcorn was designated as a New Town to house the overspill from nearby Liverpool. The countryside retreated and buildings in the countryside were demolished as the modern town expanded in the late-1960s–70s period. By the early 1970s the industrial estate at Astmoor was completed erasing all buildings apart from the former farmhouse(Ivy House). The last known use of the building was as a cattery before purchase by the current owner. Since this time the house had remained empty and been subjected to considerable vandalism. The Listed building could not be reconciled with its modern surroundings and the integrity and setting of Ivy House was totally compromised. The building had been on fire, most of the roofline had fallen in, walls were unstable and the building was derelict. the documentary sources revealed that James Bibby built the present five storey warehouse and mill on the site of an earlier two storey warehouse in c1881. Although the building was initially owned and occupied by Bibby, subsequently trading as J Bibby and Sons, who were corn merchants and millers, it was occupied by W & J Pye (latterly Pye Bibby Agriculture) for most of the time since its construction. Initially the building was used as a warehouse and mill forming part of the wider quay-scape, and has been used for offices at first utilised by W & J Pye and by the Lancaster and District YMCA, whose headquarters it later became. The building recording identified four or possibly five phases of construction and alteration within the building, the earliest being the initial period of construction c.1881, followed by relatively minor alterations shortly after associated with the removal and replacement of a gas powered engine and associated machinery. This was followed by the change of use of the building into offices, with the associated insertion of various partition walls, a lift, and a staircase. The building was an interesting example of a warehouse that incorporated its own processing facilities, in this case the milling of grain to produce animal feed and flour. The main structure appeared to have essentially been constructed in one phase, presumably around the middle of 1942, as part of the pre-planning for the re-establishment of cable links to the Continent following the allied invasion. A terrace would have been cut out of the bank and the longitudinal walls 2/4 and 3/5 constructed, leaving a gap for the entrance. The timber cills were then added onto which the iron trusses and timber purlins were constructed to form the shell of the Nissan hut. The corrugated sheet former was added to the purlins prior to the concrete being poured (presumably using exterior formwork as well). Once set it is likely the two brick shafts/vents as well as the timber and bitumen sheet formwork on the east and west ends were constructed with the concrete end walls then being poured (again also using external formwork). It appeared likely that the retaining walls for the entrance were then added (further observation would be needed to check this), quite possibly at the same time as the internal walls were inserted, followed by the floors. It was possible the entranceway was intended to have a pair of staggered blast walls which were never built as the guard-room was considered enough protection (or potentially was added late in the design). The internal room functions were not certain (with the exception of Room 5) but it appeared that

Room 1 was a guard room, Rooms 2 and 3 were for offices and stores, Room 4 was an entrance lobby with chemical toilets, Room 5 was the main equipment area and insulated/sound-proofed Room 6 was probably for an emergency generator. All rooms appeared to have been well equipped with electric lighting. The internal cable ducting, both underfloor, above floor and that exiting/entering the structure were obviously a mix of phases. Some were contemporary with the build, having been cast in the concrete floors. However, some had clearly been cut through the internal walls after they were built. This need not be an indicator of a significantly later change as many of the lighting ducts were also cut through the walls. It may simply have been the result of the electricians/GPO staff undertaking their work after the building was completed by a separate contractor. It was interesting to note that the pipe ducts leaving the structure on the east and west ends were of different types, suggesting not all were laid at the same time and that some alteration was needed during the lifespan of the building as equipment and requirements changed. It was possible military and post office archives existed that may shed light on the changing internal arrangements of the building. The structure was in very good condition and retained a number of notable internal fixtures and fittings. It was one of the few cable stations built along the south coast in anticipation of the Allied landings in Europe. Whether the other stations at Dover, Southbourne, Swanage and Dartmouth survived was unknown. These sites represent a vital, but usually unknown, aspect of the wartime infrastructure. A survey was carried out of the building. Though the barn appeared to be in a semi-derelict state, this extended mainly to the external weatherboarding. The main frame was complete and appeared to be in a generally good state of preservation. To judge from the architectural features, and in particular the style of its roof [of which three other similar local examples were known] this five-bay barn dated from the late-16th or early 17th century and was built for the storage and processing of arable crops. Originally it incorporated lean-to cattle outshuts at each end, though both these had since been removed. In 1847 a stone-walled stable was built at the north-eastern corner of the northern lean-to, which was still extant at this date, and at this same general period improvements were made to the southern end of the barn. Here a low boarded partition and associated raking struts were added to the south of the threshing floor. The 1st edition 1:2500 Ordnance Survey map indicated that by 1874-5 the southern end lean-to had been removed, and that the northern end had been replaced by a cart shed. This was open-fronted to the north with a Sussex-bonded brick wall towards the west and made use of the stable wall on the east. To the west of the barn was shown an attached yard, with a second range of north-south aligned buildings delineating its western side. This 19th-century brick-built range still survived, though it was semi-derelict. The 1847 stable appeared to have been sized down by the removal of its southern wall; a small shelter was erected backing onto the cart shed to the west, with two pens in front. In its later phases the barn appeared to have been used solely for animal housing. The former crop-storage bays to the south of the wagon way were now accessed via an external doorway cut through the west wall, reached via the yard shown in the 1874-5 O.S. plan. The area was partially divided by a low axial partition, a feeding rack was attached to the front walls, with troughs against the rear wall and southern end wall. At the other end of the barn three separate stalls, with brick feeding trough, were formed by short divisions projecting southwards from the northern end wall. [Au(abr)]

Nothing survived of the earliest house, which was probably of medieval date. Its eastern end was retained when the western part was rebuilt in the mid-16th century. On the ground floor the period-B two-bay range housed a large floored hall, heated by some form of chimney built against the rear wall with a divided parlour. The retained period-A part was assumed to have

been the services of the medieval house. The same period-B room arrangement was adopted at first-floor level, with a large attic room above. The construction was timber framing with walls of foot braced small-panel type. The roof [later rebuilt] was steeply pitched with a hipped western end. It seemed in the 17th century that the retained period-A part of the house was destroyed, at which time a new two-flue chimney was constructed against the eastern wall. The period-B rear chimney was demolished. Forming part of this phase, a lean-to outshut was constructed along the rear wall. Between the mid-18th and early 19th centuries periods of modification were carried out. A later period of alteration entailed under building the ground-floor walls, cladding the first floor framing with tile hanging, reconstructing the steeply-pitched roof to a shallower pitch re-using much of the original material, and adding a chimney into the south-western corner of the lean-to outshut. The new roof was the only securely datable element of these works, and must have been constructed during the first half of the 19th century, and not any earlier. The other alterations could be contemporary or carried out earlier, during the mid/late-18th century. A new symmetrically-fronted range with end chimneys and a central entrance was built in front of the earlier house in the late-19th century. The 1:2500 ordnance survey plans confirmed that this had not been constructed in 1873, but had been added by 1898. The range housed two rooms on each storey, separated on the ground floor by a central entrance passage: the equivalent space on the first floor housed closets. Some associated alterations were made to the earlier house, incorporating a new staircase and landing [both since removed]. Little alteration had been made to the building since the construction of the front range. A small pitched-roofed extension had been constructed to the south-east of the rear range and the windows in the rear part had been adjusted. An external doorway in the western wall of the rear range had been converted to a window and French doors cut through the rear wall of the lean-to outshut. Internally some subdivision had occurred, particularly in the hall chamber where two bathrooms had been formed. The period-F stairs had been removed, access to the first floor once again being solely via the period-B triangular-tread flight which was retained when the new stairs were added. [Au(adp)]

One of the most prominent houses within the village, the building originated in the early 18th century as a double-pile house comprising two storeys plus attic rooms and cellar. Despite various alterations over the course of its history it retained a wealth of historic fixtures and fittings meriting its Grade II* Listed status, including a mid-18th century staircase in the Chinese Chippendale style. The most significant alterations to the property, including the insertion of the main staircase and the erection of an extension at the rear, were probably carried out in the mid-18th century when it was occupied by a local iron-founder Richard Tapsell. Although no longer in existence, this extension was illustrated on historic plans of the house and was alluded to in a mid-19th century history of the village. Around 1935, the rear extension was removed and replaced with a smaller one which survives to this day, and other associated modifications were carried out. The building had a slated mansard roof with flat roofed dormer projections set behind a low parapet. Nos. 7 and 8, Brewer Street were both Grade II Listed Buildings and were not included in the development plans or the study. The walls on the site divided into three distinct groups, modern walls [e.g. Nos. 2, 3, 6, 9, 10, 12, 17, 18], surviving elements from historic or former buildings [5, 7, 8, 19], and potentially historic boundary walls [1, 4, 14, 15, 16]. Other than Wall 1 the potentially old boundary walls were all either side of a long plot to the rear of No. 6a Brewer Street which was the only plot on the site to remain largely intact from Brewer Street to Rose Place [formerly the Trill Mill]. Loggan's map from 1673 suggested that this plot had been established by this date and the boundary layouts were likely to be significantly older than this. Although there was an element of uncertainty with interpreting early maps it was possible to pinpoint this plot with reasonable confidence on the Loggan map as there was a long north to south range (stables?) shown on the plot immediately to the west (to the rear of No. 7 Brewer Street). Although the layout of this plot and the alignment of the boundary walls were likely to be old it was difficult to accurately assess the date of

construction for the actual walls either side of the plot. As with any similar rubble stone walls this was partly due to the lack of diagnostic features found in timber framed or brick constructions and well-weathered, later 19th-century rubble stone walls can sometimes appear very similar to 16th or 17th century walls. It was also difficult because the walls showed areas of repair, patching and rebuild so that even if there are old elements they cannot reliably be classed as old walls. Boundary walls such as these are relatively basic constructions which would be very likely to require periodic rebuilding and it was significant to note that part of Wall 16 had collapsed and required rebuilding. It is likely that most of the fabric in these stone walls dates to a construction not earlier than the 18th century (albeit possibly reusing older stones). However, due to the difficulties with dating these structures this cannot be certain, and there was the possibility that sections survive from the 17th century or earlier. They were relatively basic constructions but the interest of boundary walls and tenement plots is usually not so much in their fabric than as topographical features and particularly when they survive as well-preserved groups of adjacent plots. The proposed development site does not represent a coherent well-preserved block of tenement plots and this fragmentary nature reduces the significance of the walls (as does their generally poor condition. Rev Salter's map of the medieval tenements in Oxford suggests that the block to the south of Brewer Street was filled with north to south tenements almost as far east as St. Aldgate's. Immediately to the east of the development site these tenements have been lost by the construction of Campion Hall and at the west end of this block (partially within the development site) they have been replaced by east to west plots facing Littlegate. These plots at the west end are shown on the 1673 map. The plot to the south of No. 6a Brewer Street, together with the partially surviving plot to the rear of No. 7 are the only plots which survive in this area. There are a number of areas of Oxford where larger, more coherent areas of tenement boundaries survive such as around St. Michael's Street and Holywell. Apart from the boundary walls there also survives sections of wall from two buildings of some interest. These include the rear and east gable walls of property No. 6 which appear to survive from a significant, heavily rebuilt building which may have been of 17th or 18th century date. This structure warrants further investigation and recording prior to its possible demolition to determine whether the roof or any internal walls survive from the older building. The rebuilt brick gable in the east wall would suggest that the roof was probably reconstructed in the 19th or 20th century. Also of interest were surviving stone fragments from a former malthouse along the southern boundary of the site and further recording of this (possibly during its demolition/dismantling) would be of value. It was not considered that any of the walls were of such significance as to require their preservation in situ in the project development although it would be desirable to retain some of the older fragments where they can be practically incorporated into the new design. There is probably greatest scope for this along the edge of the site and particularly the corner of the former malthouse. In addition if the condition of the wall dictates that it must be taken down then it could be rebuilt on the same alignment re-using some stones such as the larger blocks which form the quoin. The interest of these surviving fragments from the malthouse was increased due the historic use of the area by Breweries and by the name Brewer Street. A record of a WWII personnel shelter was made prior to its demolition and the construction of a new aircraft hanger at Dunkeswell Airfield. The brick shelter had been surrounded, but not covered, by an earthen blast mound, although this had been removed prior to the survey. Measurements taken on the ground of its approximate extent corresponded with that depicted on modern Ordnance Survey mapping. The mound had been approximately 2.50m wide on the east, west and south sides, but only 1.10m wide on the north side. The mound had been formed from local stiff mottled yellow clay with flint, with a thin covering of topsoil supporting vegetation. The main brick-built structure was broadly rectangular and measured a maximum of 6.60m long, 4.45m wide and 1.50m high. The entrance was at the north end facing away from nearby dispersed hard standings and was flanked by sloped masonry on the sides of the shelter. The entrance gave access to a 5.50m long corridor, which in turn led into two rectangular chambers, 2.65m long by 1.45m and 1.60m wide. The shelter was constructed of unmarked frogged coarse red bricks laid in English Bond, and bonded with cement. The upper course was set on edge. The shelter was constructed on a 0.15m thick concrete plinth. This plinth was not reinforced, and did not extend beyond the extent of the walls. There was no surviving roof, and there was no evidence to indicate that the shelter had a roof. The complex of historic buildings at Venmore Farm was constructed as a planned farmstead in the mid-19th century, which appeared to have replaced earlier buildings with a less formal layout than the 19th century buildings. The listing descriptions for both the farmhouse and farm buildings give the date of this rebuilding as being in the 1840s. However, there was some evidence to indicate that farm was constructed at a later date, perhaps in the 1850s or 1860s. The whole complex was constructed in brick, and the use of bullnose brick was not common until the second half of the 19th century. In West Devon, it was shown that brick was used in the rebuilding of farmhouses on the Maristow Estate from the late-1850s, one reason given being the abolition of the brick tax in 1852. The listing description for the house suggested the farm was one of the first to be rebuilt by the Rolle Estate as part of their improvements in the 19th century. The architecture of Venmore Farm was comparable to the other late-19th century Rolle Estate farms. However, there were some differences, in the lack of corbels supporting the gable ends of roofs, and the taller design of the two storey ranges that negated the need for dormer windows and tall, projecting entrance ways. It was also noted that Venmore Farm was constructed entirely of brick, whereas stone was used in other farms. This may however, simply have reflected the lack of suitable building stone at Woodbury. The style of roof was also identical to other late-19th century estate farms on the Blackdown Hills. The layout of the farm was a classic example of a 19th century planned farm, and as such it may have formed the model for later rebuilding of the Rolle Estate farms in East Devon. The layout was typical of 19th century farm improvement with a small yard that made efficient use of space. Although most of the buildings had been heavily altered and very few historic internal and external fittings survived, the design of the buildings provided some information to their original uses. Barn 1 probably had a symmetrical appearance with a central open fronted cart shed flanked by stables, the latter characterised by windows on either side of the doors providing light to the stalls. The last agricultural use was as a shippon. Barn 2 was designed as a shippon, with most of the ground floor used as such. The west room of the range would have functioned as a root store where food for the cows was stored. Access into this room was via a large opening in the west elevation, tall and wide enough for carts to enter from the small yard. The door in the east elevation gave direct access to the shippon. The functions of the two rooms at the east end of the building were not identified. The first floor was a hay loft. The last agricultural use of the building was as a dairy and stores. The use of barn 3 an open fronted structure in the middle of the farmyard was not established. The building could have been a cart shed or a dung store. Barn 4 was also a shippon, although the ground floor was heavily altered. The first floor was a loft and this function remains in use today. Barn 5 may have had a variety of uses. In plan, the south range is similar to but smaller than barn 1. The central area may have been open fronted, but could have been infilled with timber framing and been used as pigsties. The presence of doors in the east room indicated a non-husbandry function, perhaps as a store. The door into barn 4 from the west range may indicate this room was used as a root store serving the shippon in the adjacent barn 4, although the room was quite large and could have been divided into two rooms. Barn 7 was designed as a threshing barn. Although its architectural

style was consistent with the rest of the planned farm the building displayed the distinctive large central loading doors associated with (earlier) threshing barns, the west door also originally having a canopy or porch. Barn 8 probably had several functions. The west room was open fronted to the north fronting allowing access for carts from the small yard. The hoist above indicated that the loft was used for storage. The function of the ground floor of the east building was uncertain. The building appeared to be too large for housing animals, although could have provided further stables. Another possible interpretation was that the building was a pound house containing an apple crusher. Such machinery could have been powered by a driveshaft evident in barn 7. The investigation concentrated on the recording of the heating system within the tower, with only limited observations of the system elsewhere in the church. It was understood that proposed phase 2 works to the church would involve the removal of pews within the western section of the church [i.e. to the west of the existing entrance). To facilitate this, a significant proportion of the surviving Perkins HPHW system, which was attached to the pews and included a number of long sinuous coil heaters, would need to be removed. Surviving buildings are either enclosed, fully open, enclosed with wide openings on several elevations, or comprise two ranges with one enclosed and the other open. There is no standard size or shape although earlier examples tended to be larger than later barns, and built in architectural styles in keeping with designed parklands. The barns seem to have been used for feeding, although the enclosed examples may also have been used as shelters. The roof of the building had been re-used. Alterations probably indicated that the original roof was damaged. It was possible that the whole building was replaced, and the piers rebuilt, there was no evidence or known reason for this to have occurred. The Chatterley Whitfield Mining Museum took over many of the buildings from 1978 until closure in 1991. Under their occupation Building 19 remained in use as the Canteen, however, Building 21 was sub-divided. The farm house had a complex structural history, and only very fragmentary evidence survived of its earliest phase. The earliest element was the remains of a medieval cruck truss, consisting of two opposing cruck blades and the truncated remains of a collar. These were tree ring dated to 1439. There is a small amount of late-17th century brick visible within the building together with reused internal doors of late-17th early 18th century date. The vast majority of the surviving fabric is 18th and 19th century in date. The interior of the house was primarily the product of a major 19th century remodelling, broadly contemporary with the addition of the north wing [c.1850-1860] and then a later addition of a lean-to kitchen [c.1860-1870]. An extension was built in the [1960s-70s] on the southern elevation. This was later demolished. The most likely site of the medieval settlement was where the farm stood until demolition in the 1930s, at the junction of Woodward Rd and Brinton Crescent where they meet Tomkinson Drive. With Kidderminster expanding outwards and agriculture in the doldrums, Sutton Farm was ripe for sale and redevelopment. In 1881 much of the farmland was purchased by the Worcester Land and Investment Company. However, this company was unable to develop much of the land, and in 1902 its members resolved to wind up the business. In June 1903 the farm, which still operated under yearly tenants, was sold with 52 acres of land to a house furnisher of Kidderminster. The land still had to wait a considerable time for building to take place, and was to be used to build a large council

estate. However, the houses built by the council were all to be sold. This policy was vigorously opposed by the rising Labour Party, who favoured letting the properties. In October 1929 the Corporation sold the newly built house to a blacksmith of 10 Clensmore St, at the price of £290. A good sized garden of 400 sq yards was included. This was the Kidderminster Freeholders Permanent Benefit Building Society established in September 1851. These shelters were commonly known as "Pagodas" because of their distinctive design. The Halt was situated next to the line adjoining the bridge over the cart track on the tunnel side. There was a footpath from the platform to the cart track. GWR inspected the Halt on 2 May 1905 and stated that the opening was to be in June ; but no official date was given or is known.

Although opened in conjunction with a Steam Rail Motor Service, as was Foley Park Halt the main purpose of Rifle Range Halt was to provide better access for the Local Volunteers (precursors to the Territorial Army) to the nearby Rifle Range which has since lent its name to much of the area. The Halt was closed to passengers on 4 Oct 1920 but remained in situ until the early 1930s for the occasional use by trains conveying military personnel on exercises. The 1884 OS Map above shows the position of Kidderminster Racecourse just a short distance away from the position of the Halt. A Borough workhouse existed in Kidderminster in Vicar Street in the mid-18th century. Around 1784 a larger one was built in the nearby Vicarage meadow, approximately where Oxford Street is today. A further expansion was needed and a new workhouse was erected in Hornes's Field (now Broad Street) in 1816. The workhouse was built to house 150, but by 1881 accommodated 323 inmates. Further expansion was completed in 1885 to include two hospitals, one with 66 beds for men and a second with 50 beds for women. Other buildings included a bakery, brewery, laundry and a boiler house together with a school for 120 children. These changes took the workhouse capacity up to 420. In 1889 the public house called the Tap House was purchased by the Guardians, who demolished it and added the ground to the workhouse site. From 1915 it was forbidden to keep children in workhouses and the Guardians leased "Sunnyside" in Franche Road as a home for the children. There was no record of further work before the Workhouse buildings were integrated into the National Health Service and formed part of Kidderminster General Hospital. This was erected in 1874 to a design by the local architect J. T. Meredith. The ground floor of the surviving building served as an administration block where prospective inmates were initially interviewed. It also provided accommodation for staff including a waiting area, porter's day room with adjacent bedroom, bread room and overseers' room. Stairs led to the Guardians' Board Room on the first floor with a clerk's room and retiring room for the use of the Guardians. They had a separate entrance, which led directly to a staircase to the Boardroom. Also erected at the rear were vagrant wards, mostly for men. These have been demolished, apart from one room connected to the surviving main block which was a bathroom. The original plan shows a double room and three single rooms for women. There were ten men's wards [each some 10 feet by 3 feet 4 inches] and ten labour cells across a passage [the Local Government Board required some minor changes and a revised plan showed only nine male rooms which were slightly wider at 4 feet each]. The labour cells had an aperture through which stones to be broken had to pass, and the tramps were kept in until the stones were small enough to pass through. Outside these cells was a stone yard. Provision was made on the plans also for drying ground, a coach house and stable, and a yard with a broken stone store and an unbroken stone store. Inmates broke stone as a condition of their accommodation and were detained until their task was completed. The surviving reception building with boardroom and offices still remain with modifications. In recent years until 2007 it was in use as offices, but it was later empty. The original main entrance doorway had been partly bricked-up converting it into a window, the Guardians' entrance has been completely bricked up, entrance later being gained by a new doorway, probably converted from a window. The extension to the rear of No. 26 appeared largely unaltered and this had a slate tiled shed roof. There was also a privy beyond the brewhouse on the boundary with No. 26. The Lakes was an early example of the great houses built by carpet manufacturers, in this case John Lea. The Lea family was of immense importance in Kidderminster's early manufacturing history. The Lakes was a good indication of the fortunes being made by industrialists in the town. It is also a further example of a mansion which went into decline and was demolished with no recognition of its former glory. No record of its demolition had been discovered and no photograph had been found. Sales particulars from 1919 offered an insight into the nature of this house. It was set in grounds extending to about five acres. Half of this was "rich old turf land". Pleasure grounds were tastefully laid out to include a tennis lawn and rose garden. They were well planted with shrubs and trees. The house was approached by a good carriage drive. A portico led to an entrance hall 25ft by 8ft and a back hall 14ft by 9ft. There was a morning room 17ft by 15ft, drawing room 21ft by 17ft, dining room 25ft by 18ft, with semi-circular end and entrance from lawn. Other ground floor rooms comprised a library 16ft by 12ft, china pantry, kitchen 22ft by 15ft, back kitchen and other outbuildings. There were extensive cellars under the whole house, with a coke stove by which the whole house was heated. On the first floor a large landing gave access to eight bedrooms, bathroom, box room, store room, linen room and servants' room. Outbuildings were around a yard with two coach houses, stabling for four horses, harness room, dog kennel, corn room and hay loft. The Railway Station Inn was a brick built, double fronted building with an arched passageway leading to the rear. There was a gabled roof tiled with a modern replacement for the original Welsh slates. There was a chimney at each gable end, with only one original chimney pot remaining. The different pitch to the roof indicated that it was built separately from the adjoining terrace although it shares the same dentil decoration under the eaves. The brickwork had been painted over. The two windows to the first floor at the front were replacements under the original square arches and with the original stone sills. To the round floor is a pair of canted bay windows each with four original sashes with stained glass to each bottom sash. There was dentil wooden decoration to the top of the window frame of each bay. The window locks inside appear to be original. To the southern end of the façade was an arched passageway with a ledged and braced door that led to a small courtyard and the original stable block. This courtyard had later been covered over as an outside smoking area. There were originally three houses adjoining at the southern end but these were demolished around the middle of the last century to provide a car park. To the rear was a two storey extension with a shed roof with a single chimney stack. The alleyway between the rear extension and the shed roofed stable block had been covered over creating a lean-to. The windows to the first storey of the extension were all replacements. However the ground floor windows that later opened onto the covered passageway appeared to be original. Beyond the two storey extension was a further flat roofed extension, possibly of later date than the main building, containing toilets. A lean-to conservatory had been added to the south side so that the toilets could be accessed without going outdoors. It was only possible to examine the public rooms of the building. At the time of survey, the front door opened into a tiny vestibule with a modern, glass panelled inner door. The side walls of this vestibule appeared to be original but it is not clear whether this was once a longer hallway. Originally there were two rooms either side of the front door, each with its own fireplace. The chimney breasts remained but the fireplaces have been replaced with a gas fire to the room to the left and a reproduction fireplace with open fire to the room to the right. The two rooms had later been made into an open area together with the room originally behind the left hand front room. This room also had a chimney breast, later fitted with a gas fire, and a window overlooking the courtyard. A modern, glass panelled door from this room opened into a passageway. On the right hand side of this passage a door opened onto the stairs to the first floor. Beyond it a second door, which would originally have been an external door from the small courtyard, opened into the first room in the rear extension. This room had a chimneybreast with original fire surround fitted with a gas fire. There was tongue and grooved panelling to the lower part of the walls but it could not be determined if this was original but

thought unlikely to be. Next to the door were two original sash windows that would have overlooked the courtyard but later looked onto the covered and glazed passageway. A door at the far end of this room led to the kitchen that also had a door and two windows onto the area between the stables and the extension, now roofed and glazed to make a conservatory area. The glazed lean-to giving access to the toilet extension led off the far end of this conservatory area next to a modern glazed door leading into the garden. The area beneath the stairs leading to the first floor has been used to make a servery with a bar to the room in the extension and another bar that extends out into the right hand front room. The seawall flood defence scheme comprised of two sea walls on the foreshore, referred to as the Upper Flood Wall and the Lower Flood Wall. The Upper and Lower Flood Wall trenches varied notably in depth. Access to the trenches was possible at points where the depth of the trench was less than 1.2m, enabling a series of short sections to be recorded. The location of these sections was positioned using a handheld GPS device loaded with Pocket GIS software which had OS mapping loaded as background mapping. The Ordnance Datum (OD) height of all recorded sections was calculated and the section drawings were annotated with OD heights. Where the trench exceeded 1.2m in depth, it was not possible to enter. Furthermore, the trench sides were generally very unstable, and frequently collapsed. As such, no samples were taken throughout the watching brief. During the watching brief, two archaeological features were observed. Feature 2006, thought to be a ditch cut, was observed on the north facing section of the Lower Flood Wall trench. The ditch section was recorded and its position was captured using the handheld GPS device. In alignment with this, a further feature 2008 was apparent in the north facing section of the Upper Flood Wall trench, comprising a number of large stone boulders in a somewhat coherent arrangement. Unfortunately due to the depth of the trench at this point, this section could not be recorded. These features each ran in alignment with the previous early 19th century walkway which extended from part of the former Ordnance Depot known as "Magazine A" to the foreshore. They were thus presumably associated with the foundations of the walkway, which would have had to be fairly robust enabling the transport of large quantities of gunpowder from "Magazine A" which was loaded on to vessels. A scoping study to identify current gaps in data and understanding relating to aircraft crash sites at sea was carried out. The study arose partly out of the discovery of aircraft parts and associated human remains as a result of marine aggregate dredging. Thousands of aircraft were likely to have been lost in UK territorial and near-territorial waters during the 20th century. A high proportion of these losses were likely to be combat losses or accidental losses of military aircraft that occurred during WWII. The potential resource was therefore very large. The number of known aircraft crash sites previously recorded was relatively small. The known resource was therefore relatively small. Notwithstanding issues concerning survival, the potential existed for the presence of a very large number of currently unknown crash sites on the seabed and, to some extent, in the inter-tidal zone. Recent discoveries of previously unknown aircraft crash sites in licensed marine aggregate dredging areas suggested that there was a need for urgent national and local record enhancement in areas of seabed likely to be impacted by human activities. The discrepancy between the known resource and the potential resource could be addressed by research of both primary and secondary material. However, there was a huge amount of this material and it was not complete. There was also likely to be a lack of good quality data concerning the positions of losses. Enhancing existing databases was likely to be very time consuming and therefore could most effectively be achieved by harnessing the information and expertise of existing aviation researchers, both in the UK and abroad. Much of the work undertaken by these researchers was not geographically orientated and may have required further work in this respect. In addition much of it was unpublished and therefore vulnerable to loss. Seabed and inter-tidal environments, particularly those that resulted in burial or other favourable preservation environments, offered the potential for much more intact survival than most terrestrial sites. This could be seen in the case studies examined as part of this project. However, locating well preserved sites was problematic and largely a matter of chance. Management and research considerations were dominated by the application of the Protection of Military Remains Act 1986 to most of the sites that constituted the resource. They were also complicated by the possible presence of human remains from what were, archaeologically speaking, recent casualties and by various international interests. English Heritage devised a method of assessing the importance of aircraft crash sites through research conducted for the Monuments Protection Programme. The approach suggested appeared to be simple and effective, although lists of "extinct" and otherwise important aircraft needed updating. Through the same research a basic research agenda that could have been applied to aircraft crash sites on the seabed was suggested. This required more detail and input from all stakeholders to ensure that it became a truly workable strategy. An agreed means of risk assessing known aircraft crash sites was not currently available. The question of preservation in situ needed further consideration and consultation. A preservation in situ policy had been advanced by English Heritage in relation to archaeological sites on the seabed in the last few years. However, guidelines for managing aircraft crash sites did not envisage the preservation in situ of most aircraft remains and control of the licensing process was not directly in the hands of English Heritage. Aircraft crash sites appeared to be of widespread interest to the general public and to special interest groups. Numerous potential stakeholders had been identified, some of whom, such as aircraft recovery groups, may not have research agendas that sat entirely comfortably with heritage management thinking. This needed to be addressed further. Draft interim guidance for the marine aggregate industry on dealing with aircraft crash sites at sea was produced.
