The latest programme of seven evaluation trenches were located to provide a 5% sample of the development area and to assess potential boundary features of 19th century date that may have had earlier origins. The evaluation trenches appeared to demonstrate that to a depth of 450mm, well within the required maximum depth of the groundworks for the new car park, no remains of archaeological significance were present, although their presence at a greater depth could not be ruled out.
