These foundations were themselves established upon what appeared to be the foundations of an earlier building. The former Marsh Wall was not exposed, although a combination of auger survey and observations of subsidence affecting neighbouring standing buildings suggested the route predicted in an earlier desk-based assessment was reasonably accurate. Significant amounts of redeposited soil and rubble, dating from the mid-17th to mid-18th centuries, found in both trenches probably reflects activity associated with the construction of the Almshouses in the late 17th Century. A programme of archaeological evaluation was undertaken between May 2007 and January 2008 at Redcliffe Village, Bristol. Thirteen trenches were excavated. Evidence for activity from the 12th/13th centuries AD onwards was identified behind the Redcliff Street frontage in the western half of the development area, including possible medieval hearths, drains, pits, walls and floor surfaces. The evaluation also identified the post-medieval line of the Law Ditch, an originally medieval feature that runs north/south through the centre of the development area, and demarcates the boundary to the rear of plots fronting Redcliff Street to the west, and St. Thomas Street to the east. Possible medieval wall footings, a stone-lined drain and possible garden soils of both medieval and post-medieval date were noted immediately west of the Law Ditch, in areas that would have been to the rear of plots fronting Redcliff Street. To the east of the Law Ditch medieval wall footings and further garden soils of medieval and later date were identified. An evaluation was undertaken on land at Millbrook. The site was located to the north-east of the historic core of the town, in an area where evidence for prehistoric and Romano-British occupation had been previously identified. The Fosse Way Roman road was located immediately to the west of the site. Ten trenches were excavated totalling, one trench specifically targeted the line of a former leat, which once provided power to a mill recorded in the post-medieval period, but potentially had earlier origins. The remaining trenches provided representative coverage across the rest of the site. The trench across the route of the leat exposed a shallow, flat based channel, with the inner silts containing 19th-century or later finds. No evidence for a date of construction was identified, as the leat had been probably been cleaned out on a regular basis prior to going out of use. Towards the southern end of the site a large ditch was exposed, which seemed to extend along the contour of the northern edge of the hilltop. This feature might have represented the northern edge of a prehistoric hilltop enclosure, with finds recovered from the fills comprising possible Neolithic pottery and worked flint. A further prehistoric linear feature and an adjacent pit were recorded on the east side of the site, but down slope and therefore outside the possible enclosure. Across the rest of the site the only features recorded were a linear boundary ditch and post hole, both of which were likely to date to the 19th century. [Au(abr)]

An evaluation on land at the junction of Harepath Hill and Harepath Road was carried out. The site was located adjacent to the probable course of the Fosse Way Roman road, in an area where extensive evidence for prehistoric and Romano-British settlement had been previously identified. A geophysical survey undertaken on the site prior to trenching identified a series of sub-surface anomalies, including a large number of probable linear features and what appeared to be a ring ditch towards the centre of the site. Many of the trenches excavated as part of this work targeted these anomalies. A total of 24 trenches were excavated, establishing that archaeological features were present across large parts of the site, mainly comprising a network of ditches and gullies of varying size, profile and orientation. Other features recorded include a 7m diameter, probable prehistoric, ring ditch and associated features towards the centre of the site, a large possibly modern pit at the southern end and a spread/deposit in the south-west corner, which contained a large quantity of worked flint and chert, including diagnostically prehistoric material alongside post-medieval gunflint. The general character of the archaeology recorded here was not dissimilar to parts of the Honeyditches site located c. 800m to the southwest. At Honeyditches a network of ditches was also recorded, as well as small ring ditches. On that site, however, the proximity to known settlement meant that far more artefacts were recovered and the features could be more precisely dated to the Late Iron Age and Romano-British periods. The nearest known archaeological site was the remains of a medieval manor house, located less than 200m to the east, while the pattern along the north side of Fore Street of houses, with narrow street frontages and long back closes, was typically medieval in character. The site was shown as an orchard by 1841, with a property and nurseries added by 1885. The trench evaluation comprised the machine excavation of two trenches, with Trench 1, 1.8m long and Trench 2, 18m. Each trench was 2m wide. Trench 2 was moved east of its intended position because of the presence of a large spoil heap. No features or dating evidence were found to indicate post-medieval or earlier archaeological activity within the site. Five evaluation trenches were excavated, revealing little evidence for activity on the site prior to the 19th century. The site appeared to have originated as a pair of burgage plots, probably medieval in date. The lack of early features and finds was suggestive of low-intensity use of the area, possibly as gardens or yards. By the early 19th century the plots had been amalgamated and a group of small stone and brick buildings were erected. These may have had a light industrial purpose, with one feature interpreted as a smithy and another built over

a pit containing numerous animal bones, perhaps indicating some sort of carcass processing. The paving in Trench 2 may have been related to this phase. These buildings were demolished between the later 19th and early 21st centuries, when the site was used as a garden with some cobbled surfaces and pathways being laid down. Most of the north-western area of the site would be severely impacted by the proposed development. The eastern and southern extremities of the site (as investigated by Trenches 1 and 5 respectively need not be severely impacted as it was proposed to lay this down to gardens following removal of surface concrete in the area of Trench 5). The exception to this was excavation required for a soakaway drain at the eastern end of the plot although this area had already been investigated by the evaluation. The only clearly datable features in the evaluation were modern and matched buildings seen in 19th century mapping. The proposed development would have little impact upon areas in the southern and eastern parts of the site, therefore further archaeological intervention was deemed unnecessary. [Au(abr)]

A desk-based cartographic study, archaeological evaluation and historic building survey was undertaken on an irregularly shaped plot of land representing the rear yard, garden and outbuildings formerly belonging to number 54 The Terrace. The plot was sited near to the centre of Hartland and was within the conservation area. The initial cartographic study concluded that the land was probably part of a burgage plot in the medieval borough of Hartland, and in the early medieval period may have been within a strip field system. The western boundary of the tongue of land to the north (Area B) may have originated as a strip boundary within an early medieval field-system. It was not possible to make any reliable statement about the eastern boundary. The north-western boundary of Area C was present in 1813. The eastern boundary of areas A and C was of 19th century origin. The former agricultural buildings in Areas A/C were of mid-19th century origin (1846-1862). The remaining building was surveyed and recorded. The building was of rubble stone construction with a slate roof, and appeared to be of 19th century date, but of two phases. The southern portion, of which most remained, was originally a two storey stable with symmetrically arranged openings in the north west front on the ground floor and a first floor loading door, all with brick arches and reveals. There was also a window, or loading door at first floor level in the south west gable but the original opening had been reduced, the lintel raised, presumably to accommodate another later, possibly single storey building to the south east, now removed. This feature may be associated with the former western boundary of Area A . Trench 3 contained no features, except a 0.4m wide concrete, brick and stone wall on the former site of a modern building. Trench 4 was 0.2m deep at the north-east end due to the masonry immediately below the surface consisting of a length of lime mortared stone rubble wall 0.4m in width, which aligned with similar masonry to the south-west . The slight splay in the gap between the two suggested an entrance. Parallel [to the north-west] lay another portion of clay bonded wall of variable width. Trench 5 was positioned along the proposed line of a service trench. There were no finds. Sealing this was a modern layer of stone rubble and brick containing local post-medieval earthenware and sealed by the modern tarmac surface.
