This feature formed part of a surviving network of banks and ditches associated with the street that once bordered the western side of 'Quarter 22'. Its southern end, however, had clearly been truncated by landscaping works carried out during the installation of a gasometer in 1933. The subsequent excavation of a trench exposed two archaeological features of uncertain function. Just a single piece of 19th/20th century tile was retrieved from these cuts and not one artefact of medieval origin was discovered during the fieldwork. An evaluation of the gasometer conducted by specialists concluded that despite being of definite historic interest, the structure was in too poor a condition for medium or long term preservation in situ.
