Eight evaluation trenches were excavated on the site, seven of which revealed no archaeological survival. Trench 4, in the south-eastern corner of the site, revealed party of a quarry pit. Within the uppermost fill of the quarry, combed slipware pottery fragments and porcelain were present. The area of excavation was extended to reveal a capped 19th-century well and brick built sump, associated with the 19th-century tenements fronting onto Hanworth Road. These features post-dated two quarry pits, both approximately 1m deep, containing large quantities of combed slipware and porcelain. [Au(abr)] *SMR primary record number:* 18/186
