The evaluation revealed a substantial amount of modern damage, possibly a bomb crater, extending back from the street frontage. Towards the west end of the workshop the disturbance cut through archaeological deposits. A small area of undisturbed archaeology was partly excavated revealing and 18th century stone and brick-built drain cutting through late 16th to 18th century garden soils. It was thought likely that archaeological remains could have survived below the offices and areas of truncation. [Au(abr)]

The study area was situated in an area of Bristol known to be archaeologically important. A single evaluation trench revealed intact deposits of medieval and post-medieval date, including buried soils and masonry structures. One of the masonry structures was thought to belong to the original St. Thomas Street frontage. Pottery sherds provided reliable dating evidence. [Au(abr)]

**25 REDCLIFF STREET/14 ST THOMAS STREET, REDCLIFFE*****Archaeological Evaluation at 25 Redcliff Street/ 14 St Thomas Street, Redcliffe, Bristol***

The work was carried out within a former warehouse. Two intact lengths of roof of the culverted "Law Ditch" were located beneath the floor of the former warehouse. One area of probable post-medieval roof was constructed of stone blocks, while the other comprised a 19th century brick vaulted roof and inspection pit or manhole. A small section of medieval wall was uncovered, as well as several other post-medieval walls and deposits. The survey work at 14 St. Thomas Street involved removing render from the face of a wall and then recording the exposed masonry and mortar beneath. The middle section of wall proved to be built of stone, probably dating to the late 18th or early 19th century, while the eastern and western ends were of late 19th century brick construction. The wall was thought likely to sit on medieval foundations. [Au(abr)]

**3 REDCLIFF STREET*****3 Redcliff Street, Bristol. Archaeological Evaluation***

The evaluation identified a stone-built cellar that had truncated archaeological deposits over much of the area. A small number of archaeological deposits had survived at the northern end of the trench, including the foundations of a possible medieval wall. This was sealed by a sequence of possible occupation horizons, which in turn were cut by a second possible medieval wall that lay parallel with Redcliff Street. An undated cobbled surface was also revealed, along with a post-medieval wall and several modern features. The evaluation also indicated that possible medieval deposits survived below the modern ground surface, but much of the frontage along Redcliff Street has been heavily cellared, and all archaeological deposits removed. Proposals by Bristol Cathedral to improve educational and visitor facilities involved some construction works and alterations to parts of the building fabric. As a result, the evaluation recorded the fragmentary remains of the foundations of the inner wall of the West Cloister Walk, along with extensive post-medieval and modern disturbances, including services. Two further trenches in the Undercroft resulted in the recording of a substantial Norman wall foundation oriented east to west within the south part of the room with deep post-medieval trenches in the north-east corner. Two further trenches confirmed the full width of the Norman foundation and also contained Norman or medieval floor levels and two other early wall foundations. [Au(abr)]
