Discovered were medieval quarry pits, foundry pits, the remains of Tudor buildings, evidence for post-medieval horn core working and tanning and post-medieval brick lined cess pits. Archaeological watching brief was maintained as foundation footings and service trenches were excavated by machine producing one continuous trench, which was then sub-divided into five areas. Areas 1, 2, 3 and 5 showed natural layers overlain by 19th and 20th century deposits whilst area 4 showed only 19th and 20th century deposits. Area 1 produced one sherd of Roman pottery. Two substantial houses of late 17th/early 18th century date were recorded, possibly those shown on a map of 1682. Both were basemented, one incorporating a vaulted brick structure. To the south a two-chambered tank with roof tiles mortared to the interior wall faces and a drain in the floor incorporated into a soakaway, which contained an oily yellow substance. The walls of houses, external cobbled surfaces, the foundations of the bath house, a brick built drain, wells, and pits with an abundance of finds were observed. A development is taking place within the grounds of the Royal Foundation of St. Katherine, Butcher Row, in Ratcliffe in the London Borough of Tower Hamlets. This involved clearance of the graveyard of the Early Victorian church of St James, Ratcliffe, which was destroyed in World War II. The burials were considered too recent to merit stratigraphic excavation and palaeopathological study, and were therefore removed by a non-archaeological contractor. An archaeologist attended recorded an elaborate burial vault, a large polygonal brick structure of unknown function, and a deep water-filled shaft lined and capped with bricks.
